Course Description and Purpose

This course will examine the causes and consequences of international trade. We will use both the core and new models of international trade as a tool to understand why and how countries trade, what they trade, and who gains from trade. Moreover, we will investigate trade policies and restrictions. The effects of tariffs, quotas, subsidies, and international agreements will be discussed.



MyLab and Mastering

Even though they do not contribute to your final grade, they will contribute to your success. Please see the table in Grading section in this syllabus to learn more about what assignments contribute to your final grade and what each assignment's weight on your final grade. **The quizzes and exams will be available after the due date with a 1% per day grade deduction. The due date for late submission for all exams and quizzes, unless stated otherwise, is April 29, 2022.** If you provide official documentation for your excuse, your grade may not be penalized with late submission penalty. **Late submission is NOT available for essays unless you provide official documentation.**

Please do not wait until the last hour to take an exam or a quiz. - 3) You CANNOT use multiple displays/monitors. Your internet activity will be controlled by Respondus Lockdown Browser. You CANNOT open new tabs, windows, or applications during the exam.
- 4) You have one attempt to finish the test within the availability of the exam.
- 5) Exam time is 75 minutes...

Quizzes: There will be 10 quizzes that will count towards your final grade: One chapter quiz for each chapter after chapter 3 until chapter 12. These **10 quizzes are mandatory**. I highly recommend you to take Quiz for Chapter 2 to gain practice for Mylab as well as to practice yourself on Chapter 2, and the Syllabus quiz on Canvas even though the Syllabus quiz and Chapter 2 quiz do not count towards your final grade.

- Please see the calendar for quiz dates. It is suggested that each quiz is taken right after studying the relevant chapter.
- There is a standard late submission policy for each quiz, which is 1% of the total grade deduction PER DAY if submitted after the due date. The due date for late submission, unless stated otherwise, is April 29, 2022. Please make your plans accordingly. - The duration of each quiz will depend on the number of questions on the test and will be announced when the test is online.

- There will be 3 attempts for each quiz.

Attention: Please pay attention to the due dates of each, quiz, exam, assignment, etc. There will not be an extension for the due dates under any circumstances without formally documented proof. Please manage your time wisely.

Essays: There will be 5 essays. **All essays are graded and mandatory**.

Each posting should be a minimum of three paragraphs: The introduction, the body, and the conclusion. Word totals for each post should be in the 400-500 words range. Provide supporting evidence and concepts from the readings or a related experience. Include (in-text) citation whenever it is needed. See the calendar for due dates. Late submission is NOT available for essays unless you have a valid excuse and provide official documentation.

Make sure that you read all relevant material (chapters, articles, etc.) before you start writing your essays.

When writing your essay, please:

- Include (in-text) citation whenever needed. It is plagiarism to use other writers' words and IDEAS without citation. Please see "<u>Understanding Citation vs. References</u>" article and <u>the citation guide</u> before you start writing. Preferrred format for citations are APA, MLA, and Chicago. You can also use online citation generators.
- Please do not use "Yes, this is correct" or "I agree" or "I disagree" etc. in your essays. You are supposed to write an essay about the topic. It is not about whether the statement is correct or incorrect or you are supposed to write an "answer' to it. It is a topic, and you are supposed to write an essay, such as a short column in a journal, on that topic. It is not a "yes" or "no" question that you are supposed to answer. It is a topic on which you must elaborate, comment, agree or disagree, prove or disprove without directly answering it.
- Quotations should generally not be used.
- Avoid informal language, jargon, and slang. Example: Prefer "It is likely that..." "It may be the case..." etc. rather than "I believe" or "I think". Prefer;
 - "conducted a study" instead of "did a study"
 - "examined" instead of "looked at"
 - "utilize" instead of "use" (where appropriate)
 - "great deal" instead of "a lot"
 - "furthermore" instead of run-on sentences.
- Be organized in your thoughts and ideas.
- Have a structure and flow in your essay. Do not let your ideas float around. Use paragraph or sentence correctors as needed.
- Stay on topic. Make sure you comment on every statement given in the topic.
- Provide evidence of critical, college-level thinking and thoughtfulness in your responses or interactions.
- Avoid summarizing.
- Be aware of grammar and sentence mechanics.
- Participation alone is not enough; a thoughtful, meaningful, and respectful approach in your posts is required.

IMPORTANT NOTE: There is no other extra credit opportunity in this class. There are already plenty of assignments for you to work on, and in order to be fair, the assignments will not be customized according to students' needs, and there will not be customized or extra assignments. Please do not ask for extra credit opportunity at any time during the semester.

All assignments must be completed by April 29, 2022.
